## Meeting Agenda:

- 1. In-Person Committee Meeting to be held on February 8 during the 2018 National Title I Conference February On-Site Committee Meeting Schedule
  - The in-person committee meetings planned in conjunction with the 2018 National Title I Conference are a great opportunity for any members to join a committee.
  - Committee members attending the conference were encouraged to join the onsite Government Relations Committee meeting.

#### 2. Government Relations Update (Julia Martin, Brustein & Manasevit)

- I. Congressional updates
  - a. Appropriations
    - i. Short-term spending deal passed in September was set to expire on December 8th; lawmakers were not ready to pass a final omnibus spending package, so a second continuing resolution (CR) was passed on Dec. 7th to expire December 22nd.
    - ii. Additional short-term CR was passed in December extending deadline to January 19th.
    - iii. Now some lawmakers indicate that Congress will need another short-term CR to get over some subject-matter hurdles:
      - Before final program funding levels can be determined, Congress must agree on a deal to raise budget caps for FY 2018 (and likely for FY 2019)
      - 2. Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program
      - 3. Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) renewal
    - iv. Complicated by new changes in Senate balance (Tina Smith (D-MN) takes place of Al Franken; Doug Jones (D-AL) in AL Senate seat vacated by Jeff Sessions and filled by Luther Strange) – now 51-49.
    - b. Other items on the agenda
      - i. Higher Education Act (HEA) reauthorization, known as PROSPER Act approved in House Committee in December
        - 1. Still needs to be passed by full House and introduced in Senate
        - 2. Virginia Foxx (R-NC) Chairwoman of the House Committee on
        - Senate Education Committee Chairman Lamar Alexander (R-TN) says drafting and passing bipartisan HEA bill is top priority in 2018
    - a. Alexander is a former college President and likely as very specific ideas about what he wants to do unlikely to just accept House bill

- ii. Entitlement (Medicare, Medicaid, Social Security) reform
  - 1. Pet project of Speaker Paul Ryan (R-WI)
  - 2. Could impact school-based Medicaid
- iii. Health care (again)
  - 1. Senator Alexander (R-TN) and Murray (D-WA) working on
    - bipartisan healthcare fix for Affordable Care Act
    - 2. May slow down education legislation in Committee
- II. Administration Updates
  - a. Released feedback on ESSA plans to additional States in late December, with responses due in early- to mid-January
    - i. Many States expected to miss this deadline, forgoing ED obligation to respond within 120 days.
    - ii. Largely similar to previous responses, with many requests for additional detail
      - 1. RI, CA, PA must provide more information to prove they will identify at least bottom 5% of schools
      - 2. HI must describe criteria to exit improvement
      - KY can't include writing test scores in achievement (not offered in every grade); TX can't include writing, social studies
      - 4. NE must define English-language proficiency
      - 5. NE can't use scale scores
      - 6. CA must provide interim goals for performance, grad rates
      - 7. RI, CA must say how they are calculating chronic absenteeism as "other indicator"
      - 8. KY must explain how it is calculating grad rates
      - 9. CA must show how it is incorporating 95% testing requirement into accountability system
      - 10.PA needs to show how English language proficiency is included in system
      - 11.OK can't create "all remaining students" subgroup
      - 12.AR needs separate indicator for English-language proficiency
  - b. Innovative assessment pilot program open
    - i. New ESSA grant program available to up to 7 States for
      - consultation and development of new assessment systems
    - ii. <u>States must file notice of intent to apply by February 2nd</u>1. Applications due April 4th
  - c. Administration staffing
    - i. President Trump plans to nominate Marie Royce as assistant secretary of State for educational and cultural affairs. Royce is the CEO of her own LLC in Fullerton, Calif.
- III. Questions?
  - Clarification was requested on the Innovative Assessment Demonstration Program:
    - It is a pilot program limited to 7 states over the first 3 years
    - The application to get authority to develop assessments is similar to a grant application but has no funding attached
    - The program can be expanding in the future based on its success and available funding

#### 3. Other

• The status of individual State Plans was reviewed. Some states are getting requests for further clarification and resubmitting rather than requesting an extension.
