What are the roles and responsibilities of an ombuds?

An ombudsman:

- Serves as an SEA's primary point of contact for addressing questions and concerns from private school officials and LEAs regarding the provision of ESEA equitable services.
- May provide technical assistance for SEA staff administering applicable programs, LEA staff, and private school officials.



Title I, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as Amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act: Providing Equitable Services to Eligible Private School Children, Teachers, and Families Updated Non-Regulatory Guidance, October 7, 2019, Updated May 17, 2023

LEAs who receive federal funds are required to provide equitable services for eligible private nonprofit school children, teachers, and other educational personnel.
